Abraham Greenleaf was born in Norridgewok, Maine on the 22nd day of September, 1820. He was the second child of Thomas and Mary Greenleaf (nee Young). Abraham had four brothers and two sisters. The 1850 census records show Abraham living in Somerset County, Maine. He is said to be 25 years of age, and the records show he is a clock maker from Connecticut.

Sometime between 1850 and 1854, Abraham leaves Maine and moves to South Carolina. He lives in the town of Fairplay. The town is in the Walhalla District of South Carolina. Abraham may have moved to South Carolina with one of his brothers. Abraham is said to be a tin shop owner.

On August 10th, 1854, Abraham marries Maria Josephine Harbin of Fairplay, South Carolina. Maria Josephine Harbin was born on August 12, 1835 (she is two days short of her 19th birthday). She is the daughter of Morgan Harbin, also of Fairplay. The South Carolina census records of August 30, 1860 show Abraham Greenleaf as living in Spartanburg, South Carolina. He is listed as a carriage maker, age 40. His wife is listed as M. J., age 25, no children. — 8

On January 29, 1862, Abraham Greenleaf joins the Confederate Army. His military records show he is enlisted into the 3rd Battalion, South Carolina volunteer Cavalry, Company C. the 3rd Battalion, S. C. volunteer Cavalry, Company C, was mustered in the field as such, but was officially designated by the C.S.A. as 4th Battalion South Carolina Cavalry, on August 22, 1863, and in that same month was listed as a private in the 5th S. C. State Troops, Company H.

Abraham suffered rheumatism while standing guard at Charleston, South Carolina. He was sent to the Pickens County Courthouse for the last two years of the war as an enrolling officer for the Confederate States Army.

Sometime in 1867, Abraham Greenleaf and his wife, Maria Josephine, move to Florida. They live for awhile on the Fant Plantation in Fantville, Florida. Later, they move to Citrus County, now part of Hernando County. They are next heard from when their first child, William Morgan Greenleaf, is born in Inverness. This is 1873. Their second child, James Perry Greenleaf (my grandfather), is born in Martel, Florida. Martel is just west of Ocala in Marion County.

In the June 12, 1880 census records, Abraham Greenleaf is living in Hernando County. He is age 59, born in Maine, and listed as a farmer by occupation. His wife is shown as M. J., age 44, and a housekeeper.

In 1887, Abraham and Maria Josephine Greenleaf, along with James Moore, sell property to the West Florida Improvement Company. On April 22, 1893, Maria Josephine Greenleaf dies in Crystal River, Florida. She was 57 years of age. Maria Josephine is buried in Magnolia Cemetery in Lecanto, Florida

In 1896, Abraham is living in Floral City, Florida. On November 1, 1897, Abraham sells property to his sons. The property is in Citrus County, in what is known as Plantation Estates.

Abraham Greenleaf dies in Crystal River, Florida on June 12, 1899, at the age of 78. Funeral services were held on June 14, 1899, at the Hotel Elwyn. Captain Greenleaf had been stranded on Salt River for ten days aboard his sailboat, and died of exposure. Captain Greenleaf in the Florida Times Union obituary of June 15, 1899, is said "To be a well-known and highly respected citizen of Citrus County."

Abraham Greenleaf was laid to rest next to his wife, Maria, in Magnolia Cemetery in Lecanto, Florida.

Death of Captain Greenleaf, an Aged Citizen of Citrus County

Crystal River, June 14 - Captain Greenleaf, a well-known and highly respected citizen of Citrus County, died at the Hotel Elwyn Monday evening at 7 o'clock and was buried beside his wife, in the Lecanto Cemetery. Rev. E.G. McKinley conducted a brief service over the remains in the parlor of the Elwyn at about 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Captain Greenleaf was ill but a little over one week, and the immediate cause of his demise was exposure, though he had been very feeble for some time owing to his advanced age. He started on a trip south a few miles on the _____ in his sailboat, but was stranded in Salt river, and did not arrive at Crystal River until Sunday night during which time he was unable to cook any food.

Captain Greenleaf was born in Maine, August, 1820, but moved to South Carolina, and during the War between the States fought in the Confederate army. About 1866 he removed to Marion County, Fla., near what is now Cotton Plant, but after a few years he moved to Citrus, then to Hernando County, and ever since has lived in or near Crystal River. He married in South Carolina, and had, by this union, three children, two of whom, Perry and William, survive him. His other near relatives are two brothers, one in South Carolina and one in Michigan.

Dear Ms. Thompson:

Here is the biography as promised. Herby compiled it for me. He also sends a copy of the **Greenleaf** family history, which might be of help.

We do not have any photographs of Abraham, but have hopes that a family member recently contacted in Jacksonville might!

The marker is a standard Government headstone, as would be granted to any veteran of military service. Abraham's will read:

ABRAHAM GREENLEAF
SEPT 22, 1820
JUNE 12, 1899
1ST SGT. CO. C. 4TH BN
S.C. CAVALRY C.S.A.

The stone is being delivered today to us here in St. Augustine.

Maria Josephine Greenleaf's stone will be of the same white marble as Abraham's. It reads:

MARIA J. HARBIN GREENLEAF
AUG. 12, 1835
FAIRPLAY, S.C.
APR. 22, 1893
CRYSTAL RIVER, F.L.
WIFE OF ABRAHAM
BELOVED MOTHER

There was no organization to honor Maria Josephine, so Herb and I purchased the stone. We will place them side by side. Herb and his two sons and brothers will help.

Col. John Masters, Adjutant, of the General William Wing Loring Camp, #1316, Sons of Confederate Veterans, St. Augustine, was very instrumental in our getting the headstone for Abraham. The paperwork for obtaining Government-issued headstones can

be obtained through the Veterans Administration. Proof of military history is required along with the paperwork.

On June 7, when school is out, we will be leaving on a trip to California, Oregon, Washington, etc. We are both taking six weeks off from work and anticipate returning home in mid-July. We will probably erect these headstones then, as we just have too many things going on in May before we leave. Herby's brother, Downing, had a quadruple bypass heart surgery a few days ago, and by July, should be up to attending a short ceremony for Abraham. He was particularly interested in this, because he was the one that found the piece of paper among some old photographs verifying where Abraham and Maria Josephine were buried.

I spoke with a member of the John Wesley Camp, SCV, when we attended a reenactment at Brooksville. He told me to let him know when we plan to erect the headstones, and they will send representatives from their Camp. Additionally, when we attended the Battle of Olustee in Lake City, I met a gentleman with the Captain J. J. Dickison Camp, who also indicated that they would send a representative. Decorating unmarked Confederate graves is one of the primary goals of the SCV.

How we got to where we are today:

I find it amazing that less than a year ago, Herby had no idea who his great grandfather was. It all started in October of last year when we obtained a copy of his grandfather's death certificate that showed who **his** parents were; Abraham and Maria Josephine! His place of birth was Marion County, and hers, South Carolina. From there, we scanned the 1870 Florida Census and found them both in Marion County; him as a farmer, and her as a housekeeper. From that point, I contacted Debbie Bishoff at the Ocala Public Library. She was able to provide some information on the Greenleafs and census records. It was after that, that I contacted you. It was sometime in November when Herby's brother found the worn out piece of paper among photographs, in their grandmother's (James Perry's wife: Margaret Thomas) handwriting, documenting Abraham's and Maria Josephine's birth, marriage, and death dates, locations, and Confederate military history. With the information that they **both** were buried in the Lecanto cemetery, you hit the idea about the Veterans Graves Registration Project report, and verified that Abraham was buried in Magnolia Cemetery.


In December, a woman contacted Herby at work, relating that she was originally from Massachusetts and her mother was a Greenleaf! Low and behold, she had a book on the Greenleaf genealogy, written by a Greenleaf in 1896! By this book, she and Herby were able to trace his lineage all the way down to Abraham (who was still alive in 1896 when the book was published). We have since ordered a copy of this book from a publishing company in Massachusetts. The attached genealogy is drawn from this book. This woman (Heidi Howard-Hamby), and Herby, have determined that they are cousins, seven times removed. She is very interested in the Greenleaf family history, and will

probably accompany us to Lecanto to erect the headstones. Hasn't this search for Abraham been a hoot!!

Thank you for the information about Abraham serving as a County Commissioner. Herby and I would like to try to get to Inverness hopefully sometime next month, as we would like to scan that microfilm you mentioned, to see if Abraham's name was on it as being a veteran of the local Confederate organization.

We can't thank you enough for all of your kindness and support.

Commander James B. Hayward was born 1930 in Plant City, Florida. A veteran of the 11th Airborn Division during the Korean War, Cmdr. Hayward retired from the US Army as a CWO 4. He attained an Associate Degree from Florida Central College in 1960. A Master Mason of the Blue Lodge, Cmdr. Hayward is also a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of Union Veterans. He has been a member of the SCV since 1985 and the Commander of the Lesley Camp for the last 7. He has an extensive genealogy and Confederate library and is known as a master recruiter for the SCV. Cmdr. Hayward is the descendant of Private John Wesley Hawkins of Co B 1st Battalion, Florida Special Cavalry during the War For Southern Independence. Besides Private Hawkins, Cmdr. Hayward documents 26 other Confederate veterans.

1st. Lt. Cmdr. Marion D. Lambert, is past adjutant and current editor of the newsletter, The Fort Brooke Record. Born 1947 in Pensacola, Florida. B.A. degree from the University of West Florida with 60 hours graduate work in Psychology. Vice-President of the Florida based Heritage defense organization, Preserving Our Heritage, Inc. and on the board of directors of the Southern League of Florida. A farmer (beekeeper) by avocation. Lt. Cmdr. Lambert joined the SCV in 1990 on the merits of the service of his g-grandfather Private Marion D. Lambert of Co. G 7th Alabama Cavalry.

Adjutant Dr. Roger Crane is the immediate past 1st Lt Commander. His Southern roots are deep in the Missouri and Arkansas Ozarks. A graduate of the University of Missouri at Rolla, Dr. Crane did his doctorate work at Auburn University where he received his Phd in Mechanical Engineering. Currently he is a full time university professor of Mechanical Engineering. Dr. Crane is a member of the Sons of the American Revolution as well as the Military Order of Stars and Bars. Adjutant Crane joined the SCV in 1989 on the merits of the service of his gg-grandfather Pvt Richard J. Harber, who served in the 7th Arkansas Infantry in the War for Southern Independence.

Chaplain Rev. Kenneth C. Simpson, a Southern Baptist minister, was born August 28, 1952 in Monroe, North Carolina. Awarded a B.A. degree in U.S. history and Sociology from the University of South Florida in 1980. In 1983 earned a Masters degree in Divinity and Religious Education from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Has pursued doctoral studies at the Luther Rice Seminary of Jacksonville, Florida. Currently serves as the full time pastor of the Knights Baptist Church in Plant City, Florida. Chaplain Simpson joined the SCV in 1995 on the merit of the service of his great great uncle Pvt. Ira L. P. Simpson, Co I 37th North Carolina Regiment, who died as a POW at Point Lookout, Maryland.

PREFACE

The Veterans' Graves Registration Project is a state-wide project in the Research and Records Section, Professional and Service Division, Work Projects Administration. It was organized by, and has operated under the sponsorship of the Military Department of the State of Florida and the co-sponsorship of the American Legion, Department of Florida.

We have attempted to prepare a comprehensive record of all graves of honorably discharged veterans of the United States (including Confederate Veterans) that may be found in Florida. The record compiled consists of a card giving all available data and their sources, concerning the service record and burial place of each veteran whose grave can be located, and plats of cemeteries in which such graves are to be found. Cards and plats are filed as permanent records in the office of the Adjutant General in the State Arsenal, St. Augustine, Florida.

The project wishes to record here its particular indebtedness to the Adjutant General and his staff for the invaluable assistance they have rendered throughout the survey. Service and patriotic organizations whose cooperation is gratefully acknowledged are The American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, United Spanish War Veterans, United Daughters of the Confederacy, United Sons of the Confederacy, Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the American Revolution, The American Red Cross and local units of the Florida National Guard.

It is impractical to enumerate in this volume the various state, county and local officials, as well as the numerous agencies, organizations and individuals who have made valuable contributions to this survey. However, we wish to acknowledge this splendid cooperation, without which the compilation and publication of this survey would not have been possible. We trust that the potential usefulness of this record will justify this cooperation.


Dear Ms Thompson:

This headstone is 42 inches long, 13 inches wide, and 4 inches thick. Weight is approximately 230 pounds. Variations may occur in stone color, and the marble may contain light to moderate veining.

BRONZE NICHE



This niche marker is 8-1/2 inches long, 5-1/2 inches wide, with 7/16 inches rise. Weight is approximately 3 pounds; mounting bolts and washers are furnished with the marker.

FLAT TYPES

BRONZE



This grave marker is 24 inches long, 12 inches wide, with 3/4 inch rise. Weight is approximately 18 pounds. Anchor bolts, nuts and washers for fastening to a base are furnished with the marker. The base is not furnished by the Government.

LIGHT GRAY GRANITE OR WHITE MARBLE



This grave marker is 24 inches long, 12 inches wide, and 4 inches thick. Weight is approximately 130 pounds. Variations may occur in stone color; the marble may contain light to moderate veining.

NOTE: In addition to the headstone and markers pictured, two special styles of upright marble headstones and flat markers are available upon request - one for those who served with the Union Forces, Civil War, or during the Spanish-American War; and the other for those who served with the Confederate Forces, Civil War. ENGLISH ANCESTRY

1. JOHN AND MARGARET GREENLEAF, of Ipswich, SUFFOLK COUNTY, ENGLAND. LITTLE INFORMATION IS KNOWN ABOUT THEM. THEY HAD A SON EDMUND GREENLEAF (1) WHO DID NOT COME TO AMERICA.
2. EDMUND GREENLEAF (1) MARRIED ELIZABETH FRYETH IN Ipswich, SUFFOLK COUNTY, ENGLAND, DATE UNKNOWN. THIS EDMUND LIVED IN ENGLAND AND DID NOT MOVE TO AMERICA. THEY HAD AT LEAST ONE SON, EDMUND (2).

EDMUND GREENLEAF, the emigrant ancestor, was the son of JOHN and MARGARET GREENLEAF, and was baptized January 2, 1574, in the Church of St. Mary's la Tour, Ipswich, Suffolk County, England. The author of the *Greenleaf Genealogy*, to whose investigation the early data of this family are largely due, claims that the family were originally Huguenots by the name of "Feuillevert," which was translated "Greenleaf." Edmund Greenleaf was a silk-dyer, which may give some countenance to the claim of Huguenot ancestry. The family of Greenleaf was at all events established in Ipswich, in the sixteenth century. Edmund there married about 1612, SARAH DOLE, who it is thought may have been a sister of Richard Dole of Newbury, Mass., who came from Ringworthy, near Bristol, and was the son of William Dole of Thornbury, Eng. Nine children are recorded to them as baptized in St. Mary's Church, Ipswich.

Edmund Greenleaf came early to New England, probably in 1635, and settled in Newbury, Mass., where he was granted 122 acres in the first distribution of land. His home was "near the old town bridge, where for some years he kept a tavern." On March 13, 1639, he was made a freeman. He served in various capacities in his town, but was especially distinguished in his military career. This is given in the *Greenleaf Genealogy* as follows: "In 1637, commanded a company which marched against the Indians; Nov. 5, 1639, ordered to be Ensign for the Company at Newbury, Mass.; 1642, Lieut. Mass. Provincial Forces; 1644, 'An ancient and experienced Lieut. under Capt. William Gerrish;' 1648, Lieut.; May 14, 1645, Lieut.; 1645, Capt.; 1644, was head of the Militia under Gerrish; 1647, at his own request was discharged from military service."

About the year 1650, Captain Greenleaf removed to Boston, where he spent the remainder of his life, dying March 24, 1671.

His will is dated December 25, 1668, and is in print in the *Greenleaf Genealogy*, pages 72 and 73. The inventory of his estate amounted to £131 5s. 9d.

The first wife of Edmund Greenleaf died in Boston, January 18, 1663, and he married 2nd, Mrs. Sarah Hill of Exeter, England, who had married 1st, a Wilson and was then the widow of William Hill of Fairfield, Conn. She died in 1671.

STEPHEN GREENLEAF, son of Edmund Greenleaf and Sarah Dole, was born in England, being baptized in the church of St. Mary's la Tour in Ipswich, Suffolk County, England, August 10, 1628. He came to New England as a child with his father and lived in Newbury, Mass., being admitted a freeman of that town May 23, 1677. His military record as given in the *Greenleaf Genealogy* is as follows: "Ensign, appointed May 31, 1670; Lieutenant, 1685; Captain, 1686; as Captain of Militia he went with the disastrous expedition against Port Royal, Oct. 13, 1690, to Cape Breton, and was there wrecked in a vessel and drowned, in company with nine others, Dec. 1, 1690." Captain Greenleaf was a man of distinction in Newbury, and their deputy to the General Court from 1676 to 1686. In 1689 he was a member of the Council of Safety. He was a member of the Newbury Church, being admitted December 6, 1674.

The first wife of Stephen Greenleaf was ELIZABETH COFFIN, daughter of Tristram Coffin and Dionis Stevens, born in England about 1634, whom he married in Newbury November 13, 1651. They had ten children, and she died November 19, 1678. He was married by Commissioner Dalton, March 31, 1678-9, to Esther Weare, daughter of Nathaniel Weare, and was at the time the widow of Benjamin Swett, of Hampton, N. H. She died January 16, 1718, aged 89.

STEPHEN GREENLEAF, son of Stephen Greenleaf and Elizabeth Coffin, was born August 15, 1652, in Newbury, Mass., and died there October 13, 1743, "at a great age" and surely such for one who saw so much service. His fame long survived in that ancient town as the "great Indian fighter," and he was universally known as "Captain" Stephen Greenleaf. A portrait of this redoubtable warrior taken in 1722 is reproduced in the *Greenleaf Genealogy*. His military record as there given is as follows:— "Served in King Philip's War on the Connecticut River; Aug. 25, 1675, was wounded in the battle of Hatfield; 'June 4, 1685, Ensign Greenleaf appointed Lieutenant'; Aug. 2, 1689, in the Indian War; sent to treat with Indians at Pennacook; Oct. 24, 1689, Lieutenant; Capt. Greenleaf was much distinguished in the Indian Wars, and is mentioned in Mather's *Magnalia* as commanding a company in the celebrated battle with the French and Indians at Wells, Me., in 1690, and in the King Philip's War on the Connecticut River above Hatfield." On March 5, 1696, he petitioned the Massachusetts General Court for remuneration in consequence of a wound received in the rescue of a family attacked by the Indians October 7, 1695. He was paid the sum of forty pounds. There are doubtless many other unrecorded incidents of the same nature in his life. In the affairs of the town also he was a conspicuous character, serving as townsman and on many important committees. His reputation was honorable, and his character was endowed with many virtues.

The first wife of Captain Stephen Greenleaf was ELIZABETH GERRISH, daughter of William Gerrish and Joanna Goodale Oliver, who was born in Newbury September 10, 1654, and died August 5, 1712. They were married Oct. 23, 1676. After her death Captain Greenleaf married 2nd, in 1713, Mrs. Hannah Jordan of Kittery, Me., who died September 30, 1743, in Newbury.



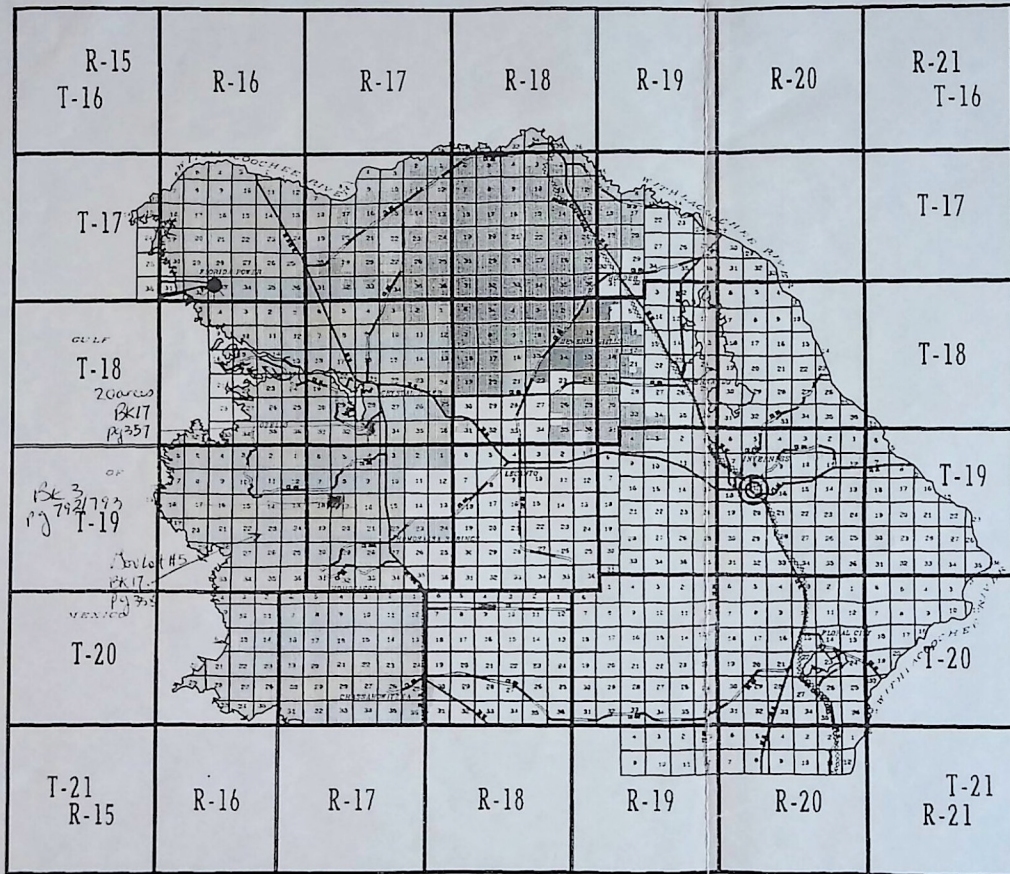

O.N.G., of Toledo, Ohio; *b.* at Batavia, New
York, 2d November, 1849; *m.* 1884, Lillian
Cortez McDOWELL, dau. of Alexandria McDOWELL,
and cousin of Gen. Irvine McDOWELL and is also
a lineal descendant of Elizabeth PENN, the sister of
William PENN, the proprietor of the Common-
wealth of Pennsylvania.

CEILAN MILO SPITZER, Banker, was educated in
the schools of Medina, Ohio, whither his family had
removed in 1851, and at Oberlin College. With his
father opened the Seville Exchange Bank under the
style of C. M. SPITZER & COMPANY. In 1877, a
branch bank was opened at Medina, Ohio, and in 1878, the German-American
Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, was organized. With Ludwig and Jerome P. WIDEMAN
he opened the bank of Fremont, at Fremont, Ohio, in 1880, but he sold it the follow-
ing year, and formed the firm of SPITZER, WIDEMAN & COMPANY, bankers, at Toledo,
Ohio. In the following year, Mr. Spitzer purchased the interest of the Widemans
and formed a co-partnership with his cousin, Adelbert L. SPITZER, under the firm
name of Spitzer & Company, Bankers. In 1887, a branch office was opened in
Boston, Massachusetts; in May, 1899, the Boston office was moved to 20 Nassau
Street, New York City. The firm is now the oldest and one of the most success-
ful investment banking houses in the Central West. Mr. SPITZER is also a stock-
holder and director in six other banks, including the Ohio Savings Bank and Trust
Company, and the Security Trust Company, Toledo; a director of the Wheeling
and Lake Erie Railroad Company, and President of the Spitzer Building Company,
which erected in 1893 the modern ten-story fire-proof building in Toledo. In
January, 1900, Gov. George K. NASH appointed him Quartermaster-General of
Ohio, with rank of Brigadier-General.



Lineage

The antiquity of the Steiermarke VON SPITZER family is abundantly proven
by the following passage: VON SPITZER, who were originally a family of noble
knights, called themselves after a village of the same name. A Morth and Ulrich
VON SPITZER lived about the years 1382 and 1394. The last named had Ursula
VON NARRINGER as wife. In 1466 a Morth VON SPITZER, *m.* Anna VON KAPPEN-
STEINER. He held some very important offices, and afterwards became Mayor of
Weinburgh. A Hadmar VON SPITZER lived about 1322. Morth VON SPITZER
sold some valuable estates to Radegund CHRISTOPH, wife of VON NARRINGER.
The VON NARRINGERS and VON KAPPENSTEINERS, with whom the VON SPITZERS

intermarried, were also a family of noble knights, Schmutz recording of the former the following: The VON NARRINGERS received after the death of Casper VON LAA, who was the last one of his family, his coat of arms. They owned in Steiermarke the following estates: Narreneck, now Waldeck; Narrangraben, now Fahrengaben, Arnfels, etc. George VON NARRINGER lived in 1380; he received his coat of arms of Duke Albrecht Konrad and Ulrich VON KAPPENSTEINER. They owned estates of the same name, which now exist. They played a very prominent part in the war against the Hungarians. Andrew KAPPENSTEINER in 1416, inherited of his wife Barbara, her paternal and maternal estates. ERNESTUS DE SPITZER, Surgeon-General, was *b.* in Heilbronn, in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg, Germany, 6th April, 1709; he descended from the ancient VON SPITZERS, who flourished in a town of the same name in lower Steiermarke, a German province, where they were enrolled among the nobility in the early part of the fourteenth century, having been allied to royalty itself. The family controlled the city government of Heilbronn from 1602 until 1682. His grandfather, Dr. John VON SPITZER was an LL.D., and burgomaster of the city of Heilbronn for over forty years. The first of the family to come to America, was Ernestus DE SPITZER, who sailed from Rotterdam, Holland, on the ship *Two Brothers*, Thomas ARNOTT, captain, and on the ship's list wrote his name with a "De," the Latin for "Von." He landed in Philadelphia, 13th October, 1747, and later settled in Schenectady, New York, where he practiced medicine and surgery for many years. Dr. SPITZER was one of the first practicing physicians, and is mentioned in both PEARSON'S and SAUNDER'S early history of that part of New York State. He served with distinction in the French and Indian War as Surgeon, at the garrison at Oswego, New York, from 28th October, 1753, to 22d May, 1755, and later received an appointment as Surgeon-General of the provincial forces. After the French and Indian War he returned to Schenectady, and practiced his profession until his death, which occurred 8th October, 1789. His remains were buried in the old Dutch cemetery in Schenectady. In 1901 his monument was restored by his descendants, and the names of his sons, Garret and Aaron, who served in the war of the Revolution were placed upon it; *m.* Barbara WILFELIN, of Dutch ancestry.

NICHOLAS SPITZER, Physician and stock farmer of Medina, Ohio, was *b.* 26th November, 1783; *d.* 6th December, 1868, in Medina, Ohio. He practiced medicine in Schenectady, until he was fifty-two years of age, when on account of poor health he gave up his profession and with his family moved to Medina, Ohio, where he engaged in agricultural pursuits and stock farming. When he went to Ohio he left off the prefix "De" to his name, which was frequently done in the early years of the Republic; *m.* Nancy BOVEE, dau. of Jacob and Maria (SCHERMERHORN) BOVEE.

Mary HANCOCK, the wife of James THOMPSON, was a cousin of John HANCOCK, Governor of Massachusetts. Another ancestor, John THOMPSON was one of the framers of the National Bank-

ing Act, and established the First National Bank of New York, the first bank that was organized in the United States under this act. He later established the Chase National Bank of New York City, the name being given in honor of Salmon P. CHASE, who was Mr. THOMPSON'S warm and personal friend. Mr. SPITZER through his mother, is a cousin of George K. NASH, Governor of Ohio. He was educated in the local schools and the Lodi (Ohio) Academy. At the age of twenty he entered the Exchange Bank of Seville, Ohio, and became Cashier, and in 1873, in partnership with his brother, Amherst T., he established the banking house of SPITZER BROTHERS at North Amherst, Ohio. In 1878 he purchased his brother's interest. The following year he was elected a director of the First National Bank and removed to Toledo, associating himself with his cousin, Ceilan M. SPITZER, in the banking and investment business, under the firm name of SPITZER & COMPANY. He is a stock holder and director in five other banks, including the Merchants National Bank and Home Savings Bank in Toledo, and is secretary and treasurer of the Spitzer Building Company. He is a member of the Toledo, Country and Polo Clubs, of Toledo, being President of the last named; of the Middle Bass Club, of Put-in-Bay, and the Triton Fish and Game Club of Canada. In 1875, *m.* Sarah Elizabeth STRONG, dau. of Lyman L. STRONG, a descendant of Caleb STRONG, Governor of Massachusetts, and cousin of William STRONG, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

ABRAHAM GREENLEAF

Although Abraham Greenleaf was born in Nor-
ridgewok, Maine, he moved to South Carolina in
the mid-1800's. It was in Fairplay, S.C., that
he met and married Maria Josephine Harbin.

When the War Between the States started, Abra-
ham was loyal to his adopted State and joined
Company C, 3rd Battalion, of the South Carolina
Volunteer Cavalry. This outfit later was des-
ignated officially by the C.S.A. as the 4th
Battalion of the S. C. Cavalry. He also was
listed as a Pvt. in Company H of the South
Carolina State Troops.

After the War, Abraham and his wife moved to
Florida -- first to the Fant Plantation in
Fantville, Marion County, and later to Citrus
and Hernando Counties. They had two sons:
William Morgan Greenleaf, born in Inverness
in 1873; and James Perry Greenleaf, born in
Martel, in 1875.

Maria Josephine Greenleaf died in Crystal
River at the age of 57. Abraham Greenleaf
also died in Crystal River at the age of 78.
He was cited in his obituary as being a highly
respected citizen of Citrus County.

Both were laid to rest in the Magnolia Cem-
etry in Lecanto, Florida. Their graves have
gone unmarked all of these years until today
as these Memorial Markers are erected and ded-
icated in their remembrance and honor.



Abraham served as county commissioner for historic Hernando County, which included all of Citrus County at the time, from 1879 -1881. I have also provided a short biography of Abraham Greenleaf. Steve Arthur is writing an article, with reference to the biography, which should be in Saturday's issue of the Chronicle.

The final days of a county pioneer recounted

This is the second of a two-part dramatic narrative on the final days of a 79-year-old Citrus County pioneer, **Abraham Greenleaf**. He found himself stranded in a boat on the Salt River in the last days of May, 1899, slowly succumbing to the effects of exposure and hunger.

The last traces of heavenly pink trickled from the billowed clouds out over the Gulf, as fingers of dark indigo spread across the sky and reached down to grasp the earth in a black fist of darkness.

Tiny no-see-ums had been working at his

exposed skin and mosquitoes fell upon him ravenously, though he was barely aware of them anymore. The hopeful breeze that had sprung up from the Gulf of Mexico at dusk turned sulky and then still. A gator croaked in the grass and cattails, and the stars slowly emerged as tiny sparkling shards of crystal sprinkled across a heavenly dome of the blackest velvet.

He had been sleeping on and off, the hunger no longer a heavy burden in his belly. His mind had been emancipated, free to drift in the still air, light as an owl's underfeather. He was back in his mind to those

early days in Florida.

Florida. After the war, he and Maria left the sadness and bitterness and hopelessness of South Carolina and made for Florida. Back in '67, that was. Florida was under military rule in those days.

They went first to a plantation in Fantville, near Ocala. And then, once they got their bearings, they packed up again and shifted across the Withlacoochee River.

Hernando County it was in

those days, later to become Citrus County. This was wild beautiful country like none he had seen before, defined and carved out from the rest of Florida by the reddish tea-colored river as it curves toward the flat azure shallows of the Gulf of Mexico.

Within those boundaries there were clear sandy-bottomed lakes filled with enormous and feisty, big-mouthed bass, crappie, bream and meaty catfish; there were great stands of cedar and pine forests filled with turkey and wild pig, and grassy hills which offered plentiful grazing for cattle.

There was farming and in the years to follow there would be citrus groves and in the 1880s, phosphate mines bringing railroads.

Abraham and Maria Greenleaf were living in Inverness when baby Willie was born — William Morgan Greenleaf.

Then there was the birth of sweet baby James — James Perry Greenleaf, over towards Ocala again, when they were in Martel for a spell. These two sons would grow and marry and live in Floral City to teach and run a shop. Their progenitors would become judges and lawmen and other important people in Florida.

It was wide open country then

but the coast was the place that called out to Abraham, especially the land around Crystal River where the Greenleafs bought tracks of land that were later sold to the coastal railroad.

Those were good days for the Greenleaf family. People around knew and respected the opinion of Abraham Greenleaf and just to prove it, they elected him to be their county commissioner, from '79 to '81.

He brushed the tickle of flies from his face as the first rays of the cruel sun pried at his sore eyes. He was aching all over. In his most recent dream, through the dawn, he had been weeping, standing at the edge of his wife's grave, in a grassy field ringed by a fence to keep the range cattle and other critters out. It was the cemetery in Lecanto with the pretty name, Magnolia.

That was six years before that Maria had passed away, in '93, and after his woman was gone, his luck shifted from bad to worse and finally turned sour as a rotten lemon.

The great freeze of '95 turned him into pretty nearly a pauper, as it did to many a man who had put all his hopes and dreams into citrus.

He was financially ruined and too old to start over. Even his body was giving up on him. He felt himself drying like a raisin, but for all of that, his mind was restless and soaring, floating in the thermals of a dreamlike state, like a buzzard

surveying the emaciated wreck of his once strong body.

His mother's voice had been calling out to him more and more, so that he had taken to ignoring her entreaties.

He didn't even hear the people in the boat calling to him or feel the shock as the bow of their craft bumped into his boat. They peered into his boat: "Captain Greenleaf! Abe Greenleaf, is that you?"

They came upon him on a Sunday afternoon, and they brought him back to the hotel in Crystal River where they put him in a bed and summoned the doctor.

He drifted somewhere between life and death for a week and then, at 7 p.m. on Monday, June 12, 1899, in that same bed at the Hotel Elwyn, the dreams claimed him and he gave up the ghost. Cause of death was scrawled on the certificate as due to exposure.

Next day, at 2:30 p.m., a brief service was held in the parlor of the hotel, given by the Rev. E.G. McKinley.

After the service, they loaded the box in the back of a wagon pulled by mules and drove east, down the winding sandy lane over to Lecanto and the Magnolia graveyard where they put him in a pit of sand to rest beside his Maria.

Two days later the Florida Times Union newspaper gave Capt. Greenleaf a dignified write up, calling him "a well-known and highly respected citizen of Citrus County" which he surely was.

Almost a century later, because they were in graves without permanent markers, it took a bit of detective work to find them.

The Greenleaf name lives on in places in the county though: Greenleaf Forest Road is one, just off Fort Island Trail in Crystal River. There's also Greenleaf Bay south of Ozello on the Salt River, and though not to be found on modern-day maps, there's mention of a Greenleaf Hammock.

Last Saturday, there was a gathering of the Greenleaf family standing under an awning supplied by the Strickland Funeral Home.

These were the many distinguished members of the family created by the union of Abraham and Maria Greenleaf, come to do their ancestors honor.

Among the many family members there was Maj. Herbert Greenleaf, a St. John's County Sheriff's Office sector commander, accompanied by his wife, Sheila. Sheila compiled most of what we know about the pioneer couple, with the help of our Citrus County Historical Resources Officer Kathy Thompson.

It occurs to me that Abraham Greenleaf, if his restless soul lingers there still, might in some way be gratified to learn that the government has finally done something for him.

Though they never gave him the pension that could have eased his old age, the government finally paid for his headstone.
