WHEN SCIENCE STUDIES THE COW'S STOMACH

Modern Feeding Methods Are The Result of Experimenting to Find the Proper Combinations

The expression is frequently used that we are living in an all laboratory age. Nearly everything we eat and wear are the result of one or several experimental stages.

A few years ago, I visited the factory of a well-known high-priced automobile and was told that every part of the engine was inspected every forty-five minutes during the process of manufacture. Finally, the engine was placed on a testing block and run at full speed continuously for four hours before it was ever put into the finished car.

The average public is not aware of the fact that similar methods have been employed for many years in the study of the care and feeding of cattle.

Recently I visited a well-known state experimental station. As we went through one barn I was shown a new-born calf. In fact, it was shown within twenty-four hours it would be alive. In fact, it was doomed to die before it was ever born. The reason for this was that its mother had been fed a certain kind of food for two years and this ration had not produced a single calf which lived. In every case the offspring would be undernourished, abnormal, and, in many instances, would die. The food was wheat straw, wheat meal, wheat gluten and common salt.

The interesting thing about the experiment was that in this same barn the cows fed with the same ration plus the bone meal and cod liver oil produced healthy calves which later became large producers of milk.

All through this experiment station, similar tests were being made on various combinations of food. By this means the correct feeding of dairy cattle was being reduced to a science. The results of this scientific knowledge are now available to every farmer, and there is little excuse today for the owner of dairy cattle not knowing how to keep his herd on a profitable production of milk.

We have already referred to the dairy cow as an example of a modern machine perfected throughout the years for the manufacture of milk. I think we will be of the greater regard for the humble cow and will be far more considerate of her comfort and surroundings if we know a little more about the mechanism by which she produces milk.

How many times, for instance, are we neglectful, in cold weather, of water for the cattle? We do not realize that their bodies consist of from 70 to 90 per cent liquid. Water performs many important functions in the body. It dissolves the food, acts as a carrier of food and waste, and is

ence with the normal amount of drinking water may be serious and it should be supplied to livestock in large amounts in all seasons of the year. In the winter time, drinking water should not be cold.

The digestive organs of the cow are extremely interesting. As most of us know, a dairy cow chews her food just enough to moisten it, before she swallows it. It is held in the paunch until she is ready to bring it back into the form of a cud when she masticates it and mixes it with saliva. This is the first step in the manufacture of milk. A cud will weigh three to four ounces. Each cow is chewed about a minute before it is returned for digestion.

A cow in reality has four stomachs, each one of which performs a certain function. The first stomach acts as a churn where further mastication takes place. The second apparatus is a powerful juices but is a sort of policeman to the food, removing stones, nails, and other foreign objects which may happen to be in it. The third stomach has powerful muscles which squeeze the moisture out of the food and prepare it for entering the true stomach. From there on the processes are very similar to those in other animals.

In fact that this is a more complicated procedure than the digestive processes in other animals. Therefore it is very necessary that the cow be quiet and comfortable during the period when she is transforming her food into milk. A cow, when disturbed, immediately ceases chewing her cud, which means that at the next milking period her supply will be greatly reduced if the disturbance continues.

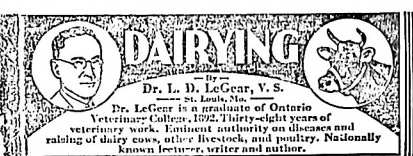

DAIRY COWS ERDUCE WHEN ON A DIET

But the Reduction is in Net Profits From the Milk and Not i the Weight of the Animal

Dicting for the Purpose of reducing weight has become a great American habit, especially among the women folk. More bathroom scales have been sold in the last years than during any period in history. A lot of harm has been done as the result of excessive and rigid diets. It is surprising the number of people who are willing to risk health for a graceful figure.

In the dairy industry we find a similar situation although for a different reason. In the last few years a good deal has been said about keeping records. Every modern dairy farmer maintains an accurate check on the milk production of his herd, and also the cost of feed. Naturally, in order to show a profit, all efforts are directed toward securing big production at a low feeding cost, and there is where the trouble is apt to occur.

J. C. McDowell, of the U. S. Bureau of Dairy Industry, tells us that a study of the records of the half a million dairy cows on test in dairy-feeding-improvement associations has indicated that few dairy herds are overfed, that quite a number are underfed, and that many of the herds are fed injudiciously.

Take the case of the farmer who feeds all their cows milk, regardless of the size, age and amount of milk produced. Only an accident will enable them to make profits in most cases. But if those same farmers will keep an individual feed and milk record on each cow, and sell off the poor producers and feed the remainder correctly, profits are certain to follow. Some after time it has been proven that cows which eat the most in dairy-feeding worth of feed produce the most milk, the most butterfat, the greatest gross income and, most important of all, the greatest average increase over cost of feed.

A little study will show why this is true. A cow needs food for two purposes, to keep alive and to produce milk. Under normal conditions about half of the food is used for the maintenance of the body and the other half goes into the milk. But that does not mean that if you increase the rations above the amount the cow needs, she will give more milk. In other words, there is a well-defined limit.

A cow that is fed too much will reproduce the same amount of milk that she would if she was fed just enough. The excess food will be utilized in adding weight. That extra weight is of no value unless the cow happens to be underweight, or unless she is upon a reserve. Overfeeding, therefore, leads to reduced production.

Underfeeding also leads to reduced production but from another cause. Self-protection comes first always. That is, a division of food between that needed to maintain the body and the amount that goes into the production of milk will not hold good when the cow is fed too little, for the simple reason that the body needs the food first. When they are satisfied these production starts. Take a cow weighing 1,000 pounds, that produces 20 gallons of 4 per cent butterfat milk when fed normally. She will produce the same amount of milk if overfed, but possibly one half that amount if underfed. The amount that goes for body maintenance remains the same in all three cases.

A study of thousands upon thousands of individual records shows that a cow which produces twice the milk of another cow will eat about 25 per cent more than the

CURIOUS FACTS ABOUT YOUR CAR AND ITS GAS

"Stepping on the gas" requires some finesse, it seems, also harm is done the car. Modern motor fuel provides all the facilities for quick get-aways and sudden pickups, but too sudden application of foot pressure on the accelerator puts an undue strain on clutch and drive line, with resulting tendency to cause clutch wear, loosen the rear wheels, injure the universals, strain the spokes and burn the tires. Often the trouble is caused by a sticking accelerator, a situation which can be improved by oiling the pedal shaft wherever there is friction.

Provide a little expert attention for the vacuum tank now and then. Neglect may cause trouble and waste, especially gasoline leakage after the motor has stopped. Don't try to fix it yourself; it's a job for the expert!

Gasoline is an excellent medium for removing grease and grime from the motor, but avoid using it on the body or other finished parts of the car. Ask your service station for baby polish; it won't dull the highly finished surface.

Don't coast down hill with the ignition shut off. Unburned fuel is drawn into the cylinders and thence to the crankcase, where it forms the lubricant. A slowly turning motor, moreover, is an efficient and powerful brake.

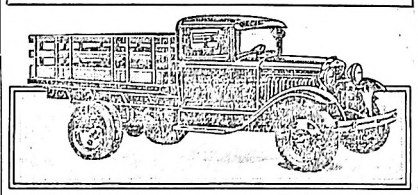
MILLION POUNDS OF CARBON BLACK MADE EVERY WORKING DAY

New Orleans, La.—Less than 100 factories manufacture yearly more than 300,000,000 pounds of carbon black, an industry peculiar to the United States.

Made from natural gas, the material is used chiefly in the manufacture of automobile tires, printer's ink, newsprint paper, monograph, records, hard rubber articles, paints and polishes. One pound mixed with oil makes enough ink to print 100 books, or 20,000 newspaper pages. Two kinds of this most finely divided pigment known blended with rubber adds greatly to the life of a tire and gives the motorist 15,000 miles of tire life where once he obtained only 5,000.

Investment is a pretty good bargain. There are a number of general rules for feeding dairy cows. An old one is to feed Holsteins one pound of grain for every three pounds of milk produced. Jerseys are supposed to require one pound of grain to every four pounds of milk with Guernseys in between. Cows are just as individual in their eating as humans. You have to study each cow and feed according to her production. You must also study the combinations of food. Silage, legume hays and grain when fed to the dairy cow in the right proportions will produce milk at a profit. For every dollar spent in feed you should receive from two to three dollars in milk. Study your records, weed out the poor ones and buy new cows to replace them. Weigh your food and your milk. It is much safer than measuring. Do this at least once a month. Or better yet, get you do not already have a testing association in your community, get a few herd owners together and start one. Then you will have an experienced cow-

New Ford Truck With Closed Cab



NEW Ford Model AA trucks and Model A light delivery cars were announced this week by the Ford Motor Company and are on display in the show rooms of Ford dealers.

Changes in the trucks are principally in the front end, which has been completely redesigned, and in the cab. The radiator is higher with more cooling surface, fenders are wide flowing, and a black wood strip adds a note of distinction.

The new Model AA trucks with the four-speed transmission introduced several months ago may be had with enclosed or open cab. The enclosed cab, shown above, is all steel, it is low in appearance, set with ample head room. The open cab is of black rubber

top material and is easily removed. Both cabs are equipped with windshields of Triplex shatterproof glass and vacuum type windshield wipers.

Model AA trucks may be had with a platform body, which can be equipped with stakes or a panel body. The chassis has many improvements including the four-speed transmission, larger front brakes, stronger springs, power take-off opening and optional dual rear wheels.

The Model A line of new commercial cars contains a light delivery truck with pick-up body, a deluxe delivery truck, a small panel truck and a station wagon. These cars have the smaller wheels and larger tires of the new Ford passenger cars.

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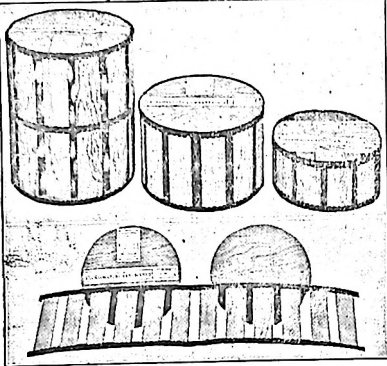

is an average of more than 26 bills to each Congressman.

The results of this vast amount of proposed legislation are not so imposing. Only 540 bills became public laws affecting groups of people or the entire nation, while 281 were written into private laws affecting certain individuals or corporations only. Committees of Congress made 2,066 reports that resulted in 927 resolutions and laws.

What the third session, which starts on December 1, will bring forth is necessarily a matter of speculation. Returning Congressmen will find a calendar already well stocked with would-be laws and will probably be confronted with reports of ten bills that are now in conference.

How a Library Was Born

Our present Library of Congress with its several millions of books cost only \$23,950 in its original state. It then consisted of the private collection of Thomas Jefferson which boasted 6,000 volumes when it was purchased by the government a century ago to replace a collection that had been completely wiped out in the War of 1812. Two thirds of the newly purchased volumes were also destroyed by a later conflagration, but the remaining 2,000 books representative of America's largest collection of literature one hundred years ago stand today on the present library's shelves.

This comparatively tiny nucleus of the modern Congressional Library is housed in a small room of its own and is easily accessible to visitors. Latin, French and English authors are prominent in the collection. Scientific works, that read queerly in the light of present day knowledge, are abundant, and there is a respectable array of political literature. Included, also, is the famous "Jefferson Bible."

One volume consists of a friendly epistle written in longhand in the French language. It advises the establishment of an American university and a system of schools. The writer, due Pont de Nemours, shared with Jefferson the idea of importing Switzerland's entire University of Geneva.
